Black-capped Vireo Vireo atricapillus	LE	E	Mid-successional shrub dominated vegetation, predominantly composed of shin oak, Ashe juniper, Texas oak, plateau live oak, and other woody vegetation growing in an open or partially closed canopy.	N	N	Urban maintained area. No preferred habitat.
Golden-cheeked Warbler Dendroica chrysoparia	LE	E	Woodlands containing Ashe juniper in combination with various deciduous species. Ashe juniper is often the dominant woody plant and occurs at all sites occupied by the GCW.	N	N	Urban maintained area. No preferred habitat.
Henslow's Sparrow <i>Ammodramus henslowii</i>	—	—	Grasslands, weedy fields or cutover areas; dense groundcover with lots of bunch grasses, vines, and brambles; bare ground for running/walking. Interior Least Tern <i>Sterna antillarum athalassos</i>	LE	E	Nests along sand and gravel bars within braided streams and rivers; also known to nest on man-made structures.	N	N	No sparsely vegetated sand/gravel bars in project area streams.
Migrant Loggerhead Shrike <i>Lanius ludovicianus migrans</i>	—	—	Open and semi-open grassy areas, farmland with scattered trees and brush.	N	N	Urban maintained area, no farmland or open grassy areas.
Mountain Plover <i>Charadrius montanus</i>	PT	—	Expansive flats of shortgrass prairie, overgrazed pasture, plowed fields.	N	N	No prairie, pasture or plowed fields.

Texas Horned Lizard <i>Phrynosoma cornutum</i>	—	T	Open, arid and semi-arid regions with sparse vegetation, including grass, cactus, scattered brush or scrubby trees; sandy to rocky soil. Timber/Canebrake Rattlesnake <i>Crotalus horridus</i>	—	T	Swamps, floodplains, upland woodlands, riparian zones, abandoned farmland; prefers dense ground cover, i.e. grapevines or palmetto.	N	N	No dense groundcover within the project area. No species detected in the project area.
